These experiences have allowed Jeff to hone his skills of teamwork, commitment, leadership, and handling adversity which he shares in a way that is applicable to everyone in their business and personal lives.

Speaker Biography

Raised in the Blue Ridge Mountains of Virginia, Jeff Evans has always followed the call of the excitement and wildness of outdoor adventure. This pursuit of passion led to the formation of MountainVision Incorporated and a career which includes guiding clients up mountain peaks across the globe, professional speaking, and practicing as an emergency medicine Physician Assistant.

Jeff's climbing began in the late 80's on the rock faces of Colorado and California. Living out of his truck with his dog, Jeff spent countless exciting days scaling walls in locales like Yosemite, Joshua Tree and Rocky Mountain National Park. Mountaineering soon followed with equal ferocity and by the mid-90's, Jeff was guiding clients as well as working Search and Rescue on North America's highest mountain, Mt McKinley.

Jeff's confidence and experience in the mountains led to his introduction in 1993 to blind climber, Erik Weihenmayer. Little did they know that this relationship would change their lives forever and result in accomplishing feats that neither had imagined. Together, they would shatter people's perceptions about the "handicaps" of the disabled by climbing McKinley, El Capitan, Aconcagua, competing in adventure races, guiding other disabled individuals on peaks around the world, and successfully reaching the summit of Mt Everest in 2001. To date, Erik is the only blind climber to reach the summit of Everest.

The teamwork, communication and leadership skills Jeff has honed during his amazing adventures and challenges has given him the tools to become one of the most dynamic and inspirational speakers on the circuit today. Regardless of age, gender, or profession, Jeff's message invokes a spectrum of thought and emotion throughout audiences worldwide. Jeff has appeared on ABC's Expedition Impossible, is the published author of *MountainVision: Lessons from the Summit*, and has played a major role in the award-winning documentaries *Farther Than the Eye Can See*, *Blindsight* and the soon to be released documentary, *High Ground*.

Session Description

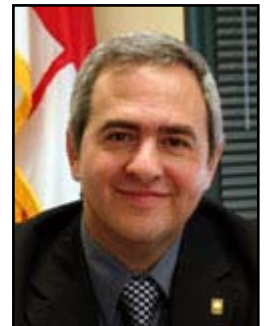
A panel of CIO’s and a senior private sector representative will address some of the questions that you, our DPI members have. Some of the questions that have been suggested include:

In this position, Mr. Adamson is responsible for the Information Management and Technology portfolio for the department. He works closely with CIC’s Senior Executive team along with the Canada Border Services Agency and the Immigration and Refugee Board to explore and implement synergistic information and technology solutions and best practices for the Government of Canada. Dave is committed to the CIC Modernization Agenda and expanding the interoperability between immigration business continuum partners to improve the integrity of services to clients while at the same time reducing the cost of services across government.

Mr. Adamson has recently completed his Master's in Business Administration from the University of Ottawa.

Speaker Biography

Liseanne Forand was appointed President of Shared Services Canada on August 4, 2011.

Prior to this appointment, Liseanne served as Senior Associate Deputy Minister of Human Resources and Skills Development Canada and Chief Operating Officer for Service Canada (October 2009-August 2011) and as Associate Deputy Minister of Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada (January 2008-October 2009).

Liseanne began her career in the Public Service of Canada in 1986, at the Department of Fisheries and Oceans, where she served until 1993. Over the years, she has held various positions within and outside of the federal government, including serving as the Assistant Secretary to Cabinet, Social Development Policy at the Privy Council Office (2006-2008).

A powerful experience for people of all ages, this speech introduces the powerful Me to We philosophy, developed by Craig and Marc Kielburger through more than a decade of humanitarian work and in their New York Times bestseller, *Me to We: Finding Meaning in a Material World*.

Speaker Biography

Craig Kielburger co-founded Free The Children in 1995 at only 12 years of age. Today, he remains a passionate full-time volunteer for the organization, now an international charity and renowned educational partner that empowers youth to achieve their fullest potential as agents of change.

Free The Children delivers innovative programming to more than 4000 youth groups and hundreds of thousands of young people in Canada, the United States and the United Kingdom. As the world's largest network of children helping children through education, the organization has worked in 45 countries and built more than 650 schools and school rooms in developing regions, providing education to more than 55,000 children every day.

Free The Children has a proven track record of success, having formed successful partnerships with top school boards and leading corporations—including Oprah's Angel Network, KPMG, and Research In Motion.

Craig is also the co-founder of Me to We. An innovative social enterprise, Me to We provides people with better choices for a better world, including socially conscious and environmentally friendly clothes and accessories, as well as life-changing international volunteer trips, leadership training programs and materials, a speakers bureau, and books which address issues of positive social change. In addition, half of Me to We's net profit is donated to Free The Children, while the other half is reinvested to grow the enterprise and its social mission.

Each year, both Craig and Marc Kielburger organize Free The Children's We Day, the organization's signature domestic event which reaches 90,000 students from 3,000 schools in person and more than 5.4 million through televised broadcasts. We Day now has the largest facebook following of any charitable cause in the world.

Craig is also a New York Times bestselling author, who has written seven books. His latest, to be released in April 2012, is called 'Living Me to We: The Guide for Socially Conscience Canadians'.

Craig has a degree in peace and conflict studies from the University of Toronto and is the youngest-ever graduate of the Kellogg-Schulich Executive MBA program. He has received ten honorary doctorates and degrees, The Roosevelt Freedom Medal; The World Children's Prize for the Rights of the Child (often called the Children's Nobel Prize) and is one of the youngest recipients of The Order of Canada. Craig's work has been featured on multiple appearances on The Oprah Winfrey Show, CNN, 60 Minutes and The Today Show; and in People, Time and The Economist.
